In addition to the regular service, special trams will leave the Davie Street Depot at 2:25 and 2:55 p.m. on weekdays; and 12:55, 1:25, 1:40 and 1:55 p.m. on Saturdays and holidays.

If you live in the Royal City, a special tram leaves from the depot there Saturdays only at 1:15 p.m.
