
Trolleys for Commercial "

The clickety-clack of street car wheels has been missing for some months from Commercial Drive but the street has not been silent.

Air-hammers have machine-gunned the road. Lengths of track have been torn, like frozen pythons, from their ancient ties—not without audible protest.

City work crews have been busy, and the rumble of heavy road equipment has progressed steadily down the thoroughfare, leaving in its wake a broad smooth surface.

Now only one thing is missing from this familiar street scene: Trolley coaches. Well, they'll be along first crack out of the box tomorrow morning.



Commercial Drive completes our rails-to-rubber program for the year. It also drains the last dollar out of our 1954 Transit Improvement Fund. Here's where the money went: To erecting 6.9 miles of trolley coach overh d wire on Nanaimo and Commercial-Victoria routes \$345,500 To purchase of 16 new trolley coaches 464,000 1954 Total \$809,500

Next year, if all goes well, the job will be finished. The ten-year task of switching from street cars to trolleys and buses will be over when the Hastings East line is converted. But more of that in a later issue. Let's run over the changes and improvements going into effect tomorrow, Friday:

* * *

Trolley coaches will replace the temporary motor buses on Commercial Drive. The present Grandview and Victoria lines will be combined in a new service which will operate to and from the downtown area via Victoria, Commercial and Powell—and this will provide a more frequent service than there is at that moment.

The complete route: From Victoria and Marine via Victoria, Commercial Diversion, Commercial Drive, Powell, Main, Cordova, Richards, Pender, Granville and Cordova, returning via the same route.

Regular stops will be used. On the new portion, between Kingsway and Victoria, and Commercial and 14th, the stops will be as follows:

NORTHBOUND — Victoria at Kingsway, 27th, 25th, 22nd; Commercial

Diversion at Victoria, Findlay; Commercial at 15th, 14th.

SOUTHBOUND — Commercial at 15th; Commercial Diversion at Findlay; Victoria at Stainsbury, 23rd, 26th, Kingsway.

All the new stops will be specially marked.

Destination signs: Coaches will carry the number 25. Destination signs will read either VICTORIA-MAR or VICTORIA-54.

Coaches will run every six minutes in normal daytime hours to 54th and Victoria, with 12-minute service to Marine. Rush-hour service will be every 3 to 4 minutes to 54th and every 6 to 8 minutes to Marine.

* * *

NOTE TO FRASER-VIEW RESIDENTS: With the Victoria service extended to Marine Drive, the Fraserview Shuttle Bus is no longer needed and will stop running Friday.

Instead of the "shuttle's" 20-minute service, you'll have 12-minute service direct into the downtown area.

* * *

There's good news for people in the Marpole and Joyce Road districts, too.

Effective Friday, all Granville-Kingsway coaches will operate to the Marpole Loop and to the J ce Road Loop.

As you know, half the Granville trips now end at the 63rd and Granville loop. Tomorrow, all will go to Marpole except a few rush-hour trips. This will make for more even passenger loading and will give more frequent service to the Marpole area.

With no Victoria coaches operating on Kingsway there will be minor changes in frequency of service. Offpeak service will be every 5 minutes instead of every 4 minutes between downtown and Victoria and Kingsway.

However, there will be 5 minute service, instead of 8 minute, on Kingsway between Victoria and Joyce.

With trolley coaches on Commercial Drive, the First Ave.-Terminal Ave. bus service will be discontinued. Service on Terminal Ave. between Clark and Main will, be provided by the Knight Road bus.

That's the picture on the changes for tomorrow, Friday. Perhaps you'll want to keep this copy of The Buzzer as a handy reference. Remember, too, transit information is as near as your telephone. Call KErrisdale 7500 day or night.
