

# There's Excitement, Drama In a Visit to the Airport

You don't have to plan a plane trip to share the excitement at Vancouver's International Airport.

It's always fun, particularly for children, to watch aircraft taking off and landing. Our airport is one of the busiest in Canada with thousands of commercial, private and RC AF planes arriving and departing each month.

Richmond Express (No. 60) buses, which connect with the airport buses, leave Richards and Dunsmuir in downtown Vancouver at half-hour intervals. If it's more convenient, you can catch the Richmond Express at Granville and Broadway, Granville and 41st or at Marpole.

The Express takes you past the south Granville shopping district, through old Shaughnessy with its beautiful trees and homes. You'll enjoy a fine view of the Fraser River from the new Oak Street Bridge before reaching the Sexsmith bus loop on Lulu Island. There you'll transfer to the Airport bus, cross the Middle Arm Bridge to Sea Island and travel on to the airport.

On the return trip, the bus from the airport will again take you to Sexsmith Loop where you can transfer to the E x p r e s s bus for downtown Vancouver. Or you can vary the scenery by leaving the Express at 71st and Oak, and catching the 4th Ave. No. 4 trolley coach into town along Oak St., Broadway and over Cambie Bridge. You'll pass Shaughnessy Golf Club and see the False Creek Industrial area.
