October 24 to 30 has been proclaimed JEFF WEEK by Order-in-Council of the Cabinet of British Columbia, "to promote interest in fostercare homes and the selection of suitable homes in which to raise children with basic security to become healthy and happy citizens". JEFF, the Joint Effort for Fostering, is this year focussing on the emergent need for foster families.

Increasing numbers of children are coming into the care of the Department of Social Welfare and private child care agencies. Upwards of 1000 homes are needed if these children, who through no fault of theirs must live apart from their own families, are to have the love and security so vital to them.

A foster family can be average people in an average home. The only size requirement is that it contain large amounts of love and understanding. . . enough for its own family and enough to spare for the child who needs a foster family. If there is room in your heart and your home for one

more, perhaps you can be a foster family for JEFF. Think it over and phone your nearest JEFF headquarters. A series of instructional television programs will be seen Saturdays and Sundays at 10 a.m. starting October 23 and 24 on CBUT Channels 2 and 9.

"Let's Speak English" is presented as a joint program by the Vancouver School Board, the Department of Citizenship and Immigration, and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

The programs are deisgned to help new Canadians learn conversational English by hearing the language used in everyday situations. The situations illustrate the meaning of the actors' words.

Text books are available as a further aid to learning, with translations in Cantonese, Greek, Portuguese, Italian, Serbo-Croatian, Dutch, Japanese, Swedish, Spanish, Danish, Hungarian, Ukranian, Polish, Finnish or German. In the case of parcels for foreign countries, the appropriate Customs Declaration should be attached to the wrappers.



More New Buses In '66

Just as the first of 50 brand new buses go into service in the Vancouver Metropolitan Transit System, we are pleased to be able to announce that we will purchase another 50 for delivery late July or early August, 1966. Tenders will be called shortly.

This week, the first of the 50 new buses we ordered earlier this year arrived and went into service. Richmond has seven and will receive another three when they arrive. Two went to North Vancouver, to be added to the 16 new buses that went into service there last year. Later this month, 22 will go on Vancouver runs and 16 will be used in Burnaby-New Westminster. — Continued on page 4

New buses, new route identification for New Westminster - Burnaby routes

Starting on Friday, October No. 53 "Kingsway" westbound 29, there will be important changes in identification of bus routes in New Westminster and Burnaby. Also there will be a rearrangement of some routes in New Westminster. These changes take place at the same time that 16 new General Motors buses are placed in service. The new buses will operate on the Kingsway 12th and Stride 6th routes in Burnaby and New Westminster. This new equipment will substantially increase seating and carrying capacity.

Reduction in stopover time at Edmonds Loop will reduce the travel time between Vancouver and New Westminster. There will be no reduction in the frequency of service. Here are the details:

The intercity route via 12th Street and Kingsway will show

to Vancouver and No. 55 "Twelfth Street" eastbound to New Westminster. The Sixth Street-Stride bus will now show No. 54 "Stride" westbound and No. 56 "Sixth Street" eastbound.

The Fraser Mills route will now be called the "Brunette" route and will be numbered 97. The Crosstown route will be called "Sixth Avenue to Braid" and will be numbered 96.

The Second Street-Eighth Avenue-Marpole route will now be designated No. 99 "Second Street" eastbound and No. 98 "Marine" or No. 98 "Marine to 23rd Street" westbound. The Oueensboro route will be numbered 95.

The new route of the Kingsway-12th Street bus will be from Vancouver Depot via the present route to Edmonds

Loop, thence via 12th Street and Columbia to Eighth Street. The buses will loop via Eighth Street, Carnarvon, Sixth Street to Columbia, and will then return via Columbia, 12th Street and Kingsway.

The route of the Stride-Sixth Street bus will follow the present routing from Vancouver Depot through to Edmonds Loop. From there it will route via Edmonds and south on Sixth Street to Columbia. It will proceed via Columbia, Eighth Street, Royal and return via Sixth Street and Edmonds to Edmonds Loop and through to Vancouver.


Agnes Street will now be served by the Queensboro bus instead of by the Sixth Street bus. The Queensboro bus will route from Sixth Avenue via Sixth Street, Agnes, Elliott and Columbia to Eighth Street. It will then return via Eighth Street and Sixth Avenue to Oueensboro.

The Fraser Mills-Crosstown route now to be called the "Brunette-Sixth Avenue" route will operate from the Fraser Mills area via Brunette, Braid and Columbia to Eighth Street. It will proceed via Eighth Street, Royal Avenue, Sixth Street, Sixth Avenue, Cumberland and Eighth Avenue to Braid Street. The return trip will follow the same plan but will route in downtown New Westminster via Sixth Street, Carnarvon. Eighth Street and east on Columbia Street.

The evening and Sunday routings will be slightly altered from the above plans. but will closely follow the present pattern of evening operation. The Stride-Sixth Street bus will be joined with the Brunette bus in the evening. It will proceed from Sixth Street via Carnarvon and Eighth Street to Columbia. and thence will travel east on Columbia and Braid Street into the Brunette area. The Sixth Avenue Crosstown bus will operate from Braid Street to Sixth Avenue and Sixth Street as at present. The present evening frequencies on these and other routes will be unchanged.

The Second Street-Eighth. Avenue-Marpole route now to be called the "Marine-Second Street" route will be unchanged from the present operating procedure.

New timetables are now available. Call AM1-4211.



This is in addition to the five new buses that were purchased especially for the Simon Fraser University service.

This adds up to 121 new buses for 1964-5-6. Value of these new buses for the Mainland operation is over \$3.5 million. All will wear the new transportation colors of off-white with the B.C. Hydro blue and green trim inside and outside.
